District Profile

The Dickinson Public School district is a growing school system in western North Dakota. DPS has been serving the city of Dickinson and surrounding communities since 1893 and is the largest employer in Dickinson, with approximately 600 staff members providing services to 4,100 students.

DPS consists of eleven schools governed by a board of five members:

- 1 High School (Grades 9-12)
- 1 Alternative High School (Grades 9-12)
- 1 Middle School (Grades 6-8)
- 6 Elementary Schools (Grade K-5)
- 2 Online Schools (K-8 & 9-12)

Since 2009, Dickinson Public Schools has grown by over 1,200 students. While growth has slowed, we are projecting an increase of almost 500 students by 2023. Our goal is to continue to hire team members who are well-educated and inspired to serve all students.






Science Achievement

FACILITY TIMELINE

With many aging buildings in the district, Dickinson Public Schools is working with professionals to break down building needs along with projected enrollment over the next five years.

Once the reports are complete, DPS will engage the community to identify a path forward.





QUESTIONS TO CONSIDER

- 1. Will we continue to see increased enrollment?
- 2. Will our Kindergarten enrollment plateau? Will we need an addition or a new school?
- 3. What is the total cost of our deferred maintenance?
- 4. Will we continue to see an increase in high school enrollment?
- 5. What is the cost to renovate the high school?
- 6. How much additional space is needed at the high school?
- 7. How do we balance Elementary enrollment as they individually begin to exceed capacity?
- 8. What is the cost to maintain aging buildings (Roosevelt 102 years old)?
