Synopsis:

Attending your first board meeting as a newly elected board member can be similar to jumping into the deep end of the pool and not knowing how to swim! New board members have so many questions: How is board leadership selected? How do I get an item on the agenda? Is it o.k. to call the superintendent every day and ask questions? Who can answer my questions? An in-district orientation program can provide valuable information and resources to assist your newest board members as they "jump in" to their new role to become effective members.

Session Approach:

Program Objectives / Outcomes: Participants will be able to: Identify and list valuable information and resources for new board members Develop a mentoring program for new board members Identify how NJSBA can help board members (new and not-so-new) Participants will be engaged through the use of large and small group discussions.

Role of the School Board:

Developing hands on materials to create an orientation notebook for new board members to use as they transition on to the board with critical information. e.g., negotiated contracts, role of the board member, state association information, board protocols, etc.

Evidence of Impact:

Data indicates that an effective board has significant impact on student achievement. Ensuring that individual members have a clear idea of their responsibilities is a key indicator of improving student achievement. New board members are at a distinct disadvantage as a member of the team. By providing an effective "on boarding" program for new members gives them a clear indication of what the district goals are and their role as a member of a team that is focused on student achievement.
